

PSAT RESULTS

Congratulations on taking the PSAT. This is your first step in preparing yourself for taking the SAT. How well you perform on the SAT will have a major impact on college admissions.

Your Scores:

To predict what you might make on the SAT, add a zero to your Critical Reading and Math score.

For example: Critical Reading Score: 49	SAT equivalent: 490
Math Score: 50	SAT equivalent: 500
	<u>Total SAT: 990</u>

1600 is a perfect score.

You can also add in your Writing Skills score:

For example: Writing Score: 41	SAT equivalent: 410
	<u>Total SAT: 990 + 410 = 1400</u>

If you add the Writing a 2400 is a perfect score

National Merit Scholarship Corporation

The “Selection Index” and “Percentile” compares how you did on the PSAT with other students in your same grade level across the nation. If you are an 11th grader these scores can determine if you pre-qualify for National Merit Scholarship or other scholarships given by College Board. Juniors are usually notified in the summer/fall if any of their scores pre-qualify them for National Merit or other scholarships.
