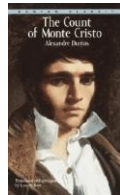
1. Read the article found on the website below and take notes on how to determine if a character is flat, round, dynamic, or static. At the end of the static and dynamic discussion of this site, follow the link to related discussions for information on flat and round characterization. Consider the terms while you read the two novels and consider author's intent in creating the characters; what motivates the characters; what triggers a character's behavior and how do these ideas support the theme? Know these terms on the first day of class.

2. Read *The Count of Monte Cristo* by Alexander Dumas, translated and



abridged by Lowell Bair and *Lord of the Flies* by William Golding. Active reading recommended (take notes!)

You will have a test during the first week of school.

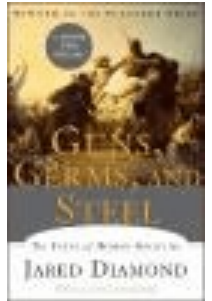
AP World History

STUDENTS MUST READ:

Chapters 1-4 of Jared Diamond's *Guns, Germs, and Steel*.

This is a big and ambitious book. It has won significant awards and was placed on the New York Times Best Seller List for hundreds of weeks. Obviously, people other than incoming AP WH students are reading it!



It is not a novel or a textbook, but is the culmination of one man's curiosity and desire to prove with empirical data (evidence that can be proven, not just a hypothesis) why history has unfolded as it has.

There is a PBS series by the same name that is optional viewing (check with the public library).
